56th Annual General Meeting Minutes April 19, 2022 - 7:30 PM

1. Welcome and Call to Order:

President Doris Penner called the meeting to order at 7:32 PM. She welcomed everyone to the meeting. She stated that MHV is much more than a collection of artefacts. Above all, it is a place where we are reminded of our Mennonite heritage. She began the meeting with a prayer.

2. <u>Approval of Agenda</u>: (Report Book Page 2) Motion: To accept the agenda as printed.

- 3. Opening Remarks: Gary Dyck welcomed everyone to the meeting. He emphasized the well-being initiative that is offered by the museum. We provide calming experiences. He explained why this needs to be emphasized. It is good for the staff, volunteers, low-income families, and people who are dealing with life's pressures. It opens up a gateway for grants, helped people during the pandemic, and was a way to connect to Eastman Immigration Ukrainian refugees. There are many ways that this initiative can open doors.
- 4. Minutes of Annual General Meeting, April 6, 2021: (Pages 3-5)

Waldy Ens summarized the minutes.

- 5. President's Report: (Page 6-7) Doris reported that the museum staff did an excellent job of telling our story in 2021, despite uncertainty and intermittent COVID restrictions. She thanked Gary and the staff for managing so well in the past year. She also thanked the board for its dedication and recognized three board members who will not be returning: Glen Klassen, Scott Barkman and Allan Kroeker.
- 6. Executive Director's Report: (Pages 8-15) Gary stated that 2021 was a difficult year. We had to shut down on May 11 to July 17. It was a hard time, but we kept busy improving the grounds. The restoration of the Chortitz housebarn was a project that was front and center as a large grant allowed us to complete phase one. Phase two will hopefully get completed in 2022. We missed Pioneer days, but the day camps were a big success. We are hopeful that the bike trail will be extended to the museum. Other events will be important fundraisers that we missed out on in 2021.

7. MHV Auxiliary's Report: (Pages 16-17)

Linda Schroeder, MHV Auxiliary President, reported that 2021 was more exciting than was expected. We had some creative fundraising ideas such as the drive-through perogy supper. Waffle sales on Demonstration days and rollkuchen pre-orders were also very successful. Projects that the auxiliary supported included the water fountain in the Peter Barkman summer pavilion, the education program, the window treatment in the auditorium and the pathway project around the pond and peace garden. Total income was \$34,391 and the total expenses were \$34,091.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT

Doris Penner | Board President

The mission of MHV is to preserve and exhibit for present and future generations the experience and story of the Russian Mennonites and their contribution to Manitoba. The question at each annual meeting is, "How well have we told the story over the last year?" I think the staff did an exceptional job of telling the story in 2022—hosting events, setting up exhibits and displays, interpreting cairns and monuments, offering meals and generally welcoming visitors to the grounds.

It was with a collective sigh of relief that the museum got back to near-normal programming after several years of pandemic restrictions. The year started by opening an ice rink for skating, followed by a winter carnival in March. Building on an obvious interest in snow sports, the end of 2022 saw the implementation of winter walking trails in addition to an ice rink as well as investment in equipment such as snowshoes and kicksleds in a move to make MHV more of a year-round facility. The General Store was winterized, and a brilliant display of lights added ambience and beauty. No doubt, interest and attendance will increase for Winter in the Village as people become aware of this new venue.

The exhibit in the temporary gallery under the direction of senior curator Andrea Klassen opened in May. The topic, "Leaving Canada: the Mennonite Migration to Mexico" created a buzz of interest and drew many people over the summer. The museum is fortunate to have a professional curator on staff to coordinate well-researched and relevant exhibits that give visitors a glimpse into facets of Mennonite history.

Festival events – Canada Day, Pioneer Days and Fall on the Farm – were well attended; it was obvious the public was excited to be back on the grounds after a period of event cancellation.

One of the highlights of 2022 was the grand opening of the Dirk Willems Peace Garden in August. The crowd gathered facing the newly-constructed pergola and the stunning Willems monument and heard a brief history of the reason for the garden and the work that went into implementing it. With the pond shores stabilized and the prairie garden in place, the area is a beautiful place for quiet reflection.

I would like to thank executive director, Gary Dyck and the staff for navigating so well the pandemic years and the transition back to normal. I am grateful for the board of directors, made up of people from different walks of life who faithfully attend meetings and give wise oversight. This year we are losing two board members, Sid Reimer after three terms and Christian Peters after a shorter time. I thank them for their service and wish them well in future endeavours. Last but not least, thank you to MHV members for their ongoing interest and support.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Gary Dyck | Executive Director

2022 was Mennonite Heritage Village's busiest year ever! Starting with a new day camp for kids in January and ending with the first-time development of Winter in the Village in December. For years MHV has desired to be more than a seasonal museum and now we can provide outdoor activity in addition to our two indoor galleries. Our events were also well attended with much engagement. People of all generations are learning about the faith, challenges, and heritage of the Mennonite community.

For the third year in a row, we drummed up approximately half a million in grants. These grants help us with the upkeep of our heritage buildings, hiring summer staff, developing new exhibits, planting trees, and now having a village that can be lit up in winter with plenty of options for winter activity. The latter, being an elusive goal for MHV that is now being fulfilled. 'Winter in the Village' will provide another revenue stream, including rentals of skates, snowshoes, kicksleds, and countless warm cups of hot chocolate.

Our inaugural Peace Trek was in August. Over 36 cyclists and runners raised \$14,000 for MHV and Eden Foundation. On that same day, we also officially opened the Dirk Willems Peace Garden



which includes a sculpture, pergola, garden, and path around the pond. We are excited about how large and special the Peace Trek will become in 2024, which is the 150th anniversary of the Mennonite arrival to Manitoba. This landing site is the starting point of the Peace Trek with MHV being the terminus.

I am thankful for all the great people I get to work with at MHV. We are still recovering from the setbacks of the pandemic. In 2023, we will build on what started in 2022 while preparing for 2024 which is the 60th anniversary of MHV and the 150th anniversary of the Manitoba Mennonites.

Curatorial Department's Report

Leaving Canada: The Mennonite Migration to Mexico

The Curatorial Department's main project in 2022 was our exhibit "Leaving Canada: The Mennonite Migration to Mexico," which marked 100 years since the migration of Mennonites from Canada to Latin America. The exhibit was based on many successful partnerships: community members leant items from their private collections to MHV for the exhibit and MHV partnered with the Plett Foundation (PF), the Centre for Transnational Mennonite Studies (CTMS), and the Mennonite Historical Society of Canada (MHSC) in the development of the exhibit and the outreach surrounding it. The exhibit lives on in virtual format, complete with videos and photos, on our website.



Outreach for "Leaving Canada" included media engagements with all three organizations represented and a webinar "Speaker Series" that included presentations from scholars in the field here in Canada and from Manitoba Colony in Mexico. Each webinar saw about 100-150 participants tune in live and the videos posted on MHV's and CTMS's YouTube channels have received a combined 4,540 views!

This viewership points to a community beyond the walls of the museum that is engaged and interested in our work.

These organizational partnerships were particularly rich and helped to connect the work of MHV with the academic and heritage community in Manitoba and more widely, across Canada and internationally. In 2023, MHV is continuing the partnership with MHSC and the PF on this exhibit as we send a travelling exhibit of the same name on the road to locations in every province from Ontario west to British Columbia over the next two years to share this important part of our history with communities across Canada.

Another exciting project in our department was the migration of our artefact database from Virtual Collections to Musetoba. Virtual Collections was software that MHV had been using for about the last 20 years, but it was

outdated and no longer supported by the company that made it, which left our collections data in a precarious position. Musetoba is a cooperative collections management system designed by the Association of Manitoba Museums designed for small-to-medium-sized museums in Manitoba. In 2022 our main task was to migrate our collections data to Musetoba and begin the long, multi-year process of cleaning and standardizing our collections data. Musetoba is web-based and therefore accessible from any computer with an internet connection, and in 2023 will expand to include a publicfacing web portal that will allow the public to search the collections of all participating museums.

Musetoba represents a great improvement in our collections care, securing our collections data, and will allow us to make our collection more accessible to researchers, artefact donors, constituency, and the general public.

As always, I am very thankful to our 2022 curatorial staff, Kara Suderman (Curatorial Assistant) and Kayliegh Penner (Database Assistant, term contract in 2022) for their work in moving MHV's mission forward through the work of the curatorial department. I am also tremendously grateful for the assistance of so many volunteers, without whom we simply could not have done these important projects. Thank you!

Development Coordinator's Report

From brand-new events and fundraisers to new partnerships with local businesses, 2022 was a year of recovery and revitalization.

Between the Spring Gala, Summer in the City, and Tractor Trek, June was packed with fundraisers. The 2022 Spring Gala focused on the theme of 'Leaving Canada: The Mennonite Migration to Mexico' exhibit, and other activities. Unlike 2019. the attendance and donation amounts were less than the previous gala (2019). Upon debriefing the event, the staff concluded that there were areas for improvement. The successes and failures of the 2022 gala were documented and will be referenced in the planning of this year's gala. Despite a rainy Sunday morning, Summer in the City saw promising numbers at the waffle hut fundraiser. While this event does not directly affect the daily operations of MHV, the amount raised in a single weekend is noteworthy. We plan to continue to grow our presence with Summer in the City by incorporating more heritage activities. Tractor Trek saw the return of many familiar faces as participants registered and rode across the backroads of the prairies. The number of participants did not quite match the previous level of attendance, but it was a successful event.

In August, Eden Foundation and MHV partnered again to host the first-ever Peace Trek. This event was established

between Eden and MHV to raise money and awareness for heritage and physical and mental health. The organizations formed a committee in conjunction with creating and launching the historic Peace Trail. As it was a first-time event, we were pleasantly surprised by the support from the community.

The Pioneer Days parade returned in 2022. Several staff members donned costumes and distributed candy to parade

attendees.

Development continues at MHV with the implementation of new systems and technology. In 2022, we began the process of upgrading our website with Homefield. We



increased our virtual presence through regular social media interactions and posting. We continued to implement virtual exhibits, established online ticketing, and provided online resources for attendees.

After an educational reopening year, it is apparent that the future holds a plethora of promising development opportunities at MHV.

Program Manager's Report

After two years, the Program Department resumed activities and events that were cancelled or posted during the pandemic restrictions. It was very good to re-engage with our many volunteers, our supporters, and our community, host our large summer festivals, and continue to develop our smaller events.

The Education Program started quickly with school groups returning in large numbers (2400+ students) in May, June, and September. Our summer staff, Meagan Pedneault and Desiree Vermette, were busy with arranging tours, reconnecting with volunteer interpreters, and planning for Summer Day Camps. Our summer camps continued to grow, as four weeks of Day Camp saw 108 summer campers and a three-day Winter Camp welcomed 14 campers. Partway through the summer, Reann Thiessen joined the education crew to assist with the planning and implementing of the Summer Day Camp program.


Our festival days, Canada Day, Pioneer Days, and Fall on the Farm, attracted 11,350 visitors (nearly matching our 2019 numbers). It was great to host so many returning and new visitors! The Winter Carnival in February, Manitoba Day in May, and the Heritage Classic Car show in July continued to flourish and develop. Summer In The City returned to Steinbach in June, and we brought our famous waffles to the Cultures area as a fundraiser.

Two activity-based fundraisers were also held in collaboration with Eden Foundation, Tractor Trek in June and Peace Trek (cycling) in August. All



these summer events were organized with the help of Jaysa Plett, our Program Assistant. We also hosted a new event in April called The Great Easter Egg Hunt, which saw over 600 participants searching for chocolate easter eggs. The All My Relations initiative provided several evenings to learn and reflect on Canada's treatment of our Indigenous friends and neighbours, including a reflective day on September 30 commemorating the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. Near the end of the year, our staff was busy preparing for the launch of our

Winter In The Village programming, designed to offer winter activities at MHV from December to February.



As you have read, MHV WAS BUSY! And we hope to continue to develop our programs and activities. We want to be a relevant space where people can experience the story of the early Mennonite settlers to Manitoba. We also want MHV to be a regular part of community life in southern Manitoba, whatever our ethnicity or background. This is only possible with the help of our volunteers. Though some long-time volunteers have retired, we continue to appreciate our faithful supporters who help us with groundskeeping, serving waffles, demonstrating pioneer skills, and assisting with ticket sales. We trust that both volunteers and staff find serving the public at MHV to be enriching and worthwhile.

Admissions/Reception:

2022 was a very busy year with visitors from around the globe. People were excited to be able to travel once more, and they came out in record numbers. Many countries and cultures were represented.



Village Books & Gifts:

With the increased number of guests at the museum, Village Books & Gifts also saw a 50% increase in sales of books and souvenirs over the previous year.

VB&G events included more Author's nights, but attendance dropped substantially, perhaps due to increased frequency or bad weather. We are evaluating how often we plan this event. The annual Christmas Market had great attendance, and shoppers and vendors seemed very pleased with the variety and atmosphere of the event.

The General Store:

There were eight vendors working in the General Store in 2022 plus space was found to display and offer VB&G items that did not compete with the artisan's stock. Sales increased by 100% and the ladies were thrilled with the added income!

The candy shop sold thousands of dollars worth of goods again. Dentists rejoice!

Auxiliary meetings are held on the 3rd Thursday of the month at MHV with an average attendance of 15.

The Auxiliary has enjoyed a busy and profitable year. The largest sources of income were the waffle sales at MHV and Friday of the Summer in the City events. The crowds still seemed to enjoy the taste of those homemade waffles on the irons! The hot summer long weekend days also called for a great number of rollkuchen and watermelon sales.

Catering to small groups in the Village Center during the winter months has kept us busy. We also catered several larger events, including the Southeast Rotary Dare Luncheon, the Winter Carnival luncheon and the Perogy drive-through supper last April, and the Christmas Market luncheon.

We were excited to create an MHV version of a charcuterie board and had several orders for these custom-made gifts. The Village quilters have also continued their skilled artistry by completing commissioned works and finishing a quilt that is raffled annually.

A hay rack sale was added to the Pioneer Days event with donated items selling at great prices for the bargain shopper. The Auxiliary supports the work of the Steinbach and Area Garden Club at MHV by providing plants, seeds and supplies for the MHV gardens and grounds. Some of the fall produce was preserved and both fresh produce and canning was sold at Fall on the Farm.

The projects we supported this past year include: the Musetoba Project for the Curatorial area, portable walls for the gallery, plaques for benches near the peace garden, workshop LED lighting and eavestrough installation, General store upgrades and Peter Barkman Summer Pavilion supplies, as well as the plants, shrubs, trees, and seeds for MHV gardens. The Auxiliary has provided the Village Gifts and Book store with unique items to sell. The aprons are still a favorite with guests as well as fabric and smaller items.
